
We've had comments about stewards having to clear up the sticky litter after a play and have made available disposal gloves, so hopefully that won't be an issue.

Jon Manley has bought new and more sturdy plastic 'glasses' that can be taken into the auditorium. Please note that these are NOT disposable, so please return them to the bar.



The Thoughts of Pliny
The importance of being Earnest
or

A Trivial Comedy for Serious people

Pliny says I do like a good stage set, and this play delivered for Oscar Wilde's satire of Victorian society, the nature of marriage, a sparkling philosophical debate of its institutions and values.

The cast were word perfect under the capable direction of Andrew Kenyon.

Oscar Wilde's play was first performed on the 14th February 1895 at St James Theatre. Initially a IV act play, Wilde reduced it to III under advisement and this format has endured.

Considered to be Wilde's most 'successful' work it remains popular, as evidenced by the attendance under the able direction of Andrew Kenyon.

Keeping to the 'Traditional' format all the players performed well, some reprising old roles, others new to the genre.

The staging was excellent, although I felt the players should have been a few inches further forward as squeezing past the potted plant and tea trolley was a little irritating after the first time or two.

All in all an entertaining evening, yet it my have been worth while investigating the ambiguities around the 'Gay' debate which surrounds this play. Jack and Algernon left me wondering at the outset where their relationship was going and what was all the talk about Bunbury?

Some critics have argued that the playwright dared include homosexual connotations in the text. However, I would argue that more generally, despite very little room for manoeuvre, Oscar Wilde managed brilliantly to challenge the social norms, sexual stereotypes and gender representations of his time, as in the reversal of gender roles between Gwendolen and Jack.

Well done to the director, cast and crew.


Where am I?

The manor was originally run by Godwin, Earl of Wessex and later by his son Harold Godwinson the last Saxon King of England. The first Norman lord of this town was Eustace II of Boulogne, and the town appears in the Domesday Book as Oistreham. By 1227 Henry III granted the town a market charter, making the new village a major player in the buying and selling of cattle in Kent, a tradition that survived to 1961 when the last cattle market was held. St Mary's Church is thought to date from the 13th century, although it was much altered in Victorian times. In 1503 the Protestant martyr John Frith was born in the town.

The church is unusual in that it displays the only known representation of a royal arms of King Edward VI (reigned 1547-1553) in a church. There is little doubt that it is the king's arms as the supporters are a lion and a dragon, and there is a curious Latin phrase beside the arms: "VIVAT REX CURAT LEX" (Long live the King, custodian of the law). England did not have another male monarch until the Union of the Crowns in 1603.

General James Wolfe was born in the town in 1727 at what is now known as the Old Vicarage due to a terrible storm on the night he was born. He lived in Quebec House-many streets and buildings are named after him and St Mary's contains not only the font in which he was baptised but also a memorial window to him by Edward Burne-Jones. The town square contains statues to both Wolfe and Churchill.

Advance Upcoming Audition Notice – Dad's Army

The Two Week Summer Show this year is **Dad's Army**, which will run from **7**th **to 19**th **August**.

The production will take a similar format to Fawlty Towers, where we will perform three of the television episodes, plus a sketch devised for a Royal Variety Command Performance, which gives an opportunity for the entire ensemble to get on stage together and have fun.

We will not be attempting to replicate the television episodes, but I am looking for the essence of the characters, enough to make them recognisable to the audience.

There will be **auditions Sunday 16th April** 14:00 to 17:00, with a further set of auditions at a later date, if required. If the scripts don't arrive in time (due 8th April, which happens to be Good Friday), we will reschedule the auditions. Rehearsals will commence at the end of May.

The episodes we are producing are *The Deadly Attachment* (aka *Don't Tell 'Em Pike*); *Mum's Army* (Captain Mainwaring's Brief Encounter moment), and *The Godiva Affair* (Spitfire Fund drive) plus the sketch, *The Floral Dance*. I'm also looking for some cast who would like to sing, to entertain the audience between episodes.

Don't be shy, there are opportunities for those who want to get on the stage, but don't want a speaking part.
