Trainee Managers still needed please. Without a Manager the performance will have to be cancelled!

Although we're doing really well in terms of audience numbers, we have some very large expenditures coming up. Fly Tower inspection and long-term safety of aforementioned, fire safety regulations to name but 3, and the elephant in the room is the car park.

We are currently going all out to raise money for the refurbishment (if that's the word) of the car park which has been a thorn in our side for many years. A quote has come in for £70,000. We're still recovering from the shock. Some interim measures are being discussed.

COLD COMFORT FARM



The Thoughts of Pliny

This adaptation of Cold Comfort Farm by Stella Gibbons came to our stage via the West Huntspill Players.

If you know the book and the story of the author, you will pick up on many of the things that influenced her writing.

Her early years were spent in a deprived part of London where she describes her father, as Good Doctor but a Poor husband, who did his share of "Mollocking"... eventually dying and leaving Stella in the role of the main supporter of the family. She held various posts including that of a drama and literary critic.

Influences included the writer D.H. Lawrence and she parodies the regional and rural fiction of the Twentieth Century.

This first play of the New Year directed by John Miles did not get to the stage with ease. Panto/Christmas/New Year and illness all conspired to set things back.

But the "Play's the thing " and "All's" was "Well" in the end.

A clever set included running water for 'clettering' the dishes, an old fashioned range, providing a wide assortment of meals from breakfast to supper' and a boiler for washing the undies.

Laura Cameron-Long as Flora Poste pulls this dysfunctional extended family towards a surreal normality, which turns at the last moment with sound of Big Business chasing her off stage.

It should inspire us all to re-read the book and some of the literature that inspired Stella originally.





Character audition details for Blackadder

The best way to prepare for these auditions is to watch the episodes because, whilst we are not doing a show of impressions, the audience will have expectations of every character. There's scope for some doubling up across the episodes, but the principal roles of Blackadder, Queenie and Baldrick have been cast. Audition pieces will be available at the audition.

Lord Percy: (30-40) A dithering berk with not much intelligence. Edmund Blackadder's companion and a principal part appearing in all three episodes.

Lord Melchett: (30 -40) Always at the Queen's right hand and not afraid to win her favour, normally by grovelling. Always trying to one-up Edmund Blackadder. Appearing in all three episodes.

Nursie: (40+) The Queen's nursemaid described as a 'mad old woman'. Treats the Queen as if she is a little baby still. Appearing in all three episodes.

Potato:

Sir Walter Raleigh: (30-40) Dashing and confident explorer. A big personality that commands a room until the Queen threatens to have his head cut off.

Redbeard Rum: (40+) a mad old seadog with no legs. A booming voice!

Beer:

Lady Whiteadder: (40+) Stern, religious woman who slaps anyone who sins. A booming character that can say lots with a single glare.

Lord Whiteadder: (40+) Still and silent. Only one spoken line as he has taken a vow of silence. A sombre looking man.

Simon Partridge: (20+) Loud, boozy, dirty-minded drunk who likes the word "bum"

Geoffery Piddle: (20+) Loud, boozy oik!

Freddie Frobisher: (20+) Loud, boozy, flatulent monk. Repulsive.

Bells:

Kate/Bob: (female, 30s) Edmund Blackadder's love interest. Played as if she is a pantomime principal boy.

Kate's father: (50+) Dirty old peasant man.

Doctor Leech: (40+) Outspoken and frank doctor who is just plain rude.

Young crone: (20-40) Eccentric mad woman who can drop the act quickly to become "normal"

Wise woman: (50+) Old and warty, grotesque old hag who is completely mad.

Lord Flashheart: (30-50) Dashing and strong; makes the ladies weak at the knees – and possibly the men too!

Unsung Heroes

Our set building team

A 'set' is the artificial environment in which a performance takes place, and is usually created from scratch - and so, Toads' directors work closely with the **VOLUNTEER** set construction team who then make their ideas a reality (or get as near to them as possible!)

The director's design can range from a complicated box set with stairs and levels (Cold Comfort Farm), to a minimal set with little - but effective - scenery (Ladies Day).

Whatever the play demands, the final result is always a creative collaboration between director and our talented set building team!

They can build the perfect room or garden, make flat surfaces look like solid walls, paint the stage floor to look like tiles, floorboards, cobbles or paving stones. They can hang doors and windows that open and close smoothly (vitally important - as any actor will tell you!), build extra bits on trucks to be pushed on for special effects (the memorable train in 'Dad's Army').

They can extend the set beyond the stage area with glimpses of a garden, another room, a beautiful blue sky – because it's not just what's on the stage that matters. The list goes on!

What are our set team's strengths?

Technical knowledge and inventiveness; a mixture of conventional DIY skills such as carpentry, decorating and problem-solving; having an eye for structure, texture, colour, light and shade; an ability to deal with impossible requests and keep smiling; an ability to deal with exhausted, tearful directors; an ability to drink endless mugs of tea and scoff whole packets of biscuits...

Thank goodness we have them!

	wife for her money. Tony is the lead role. Ideal playing age = 35 to 45. Captain
Lesgate	Crook, always "on the make". Nowadays would be guilty of romance
	fraud. Hired by Tony as a potential assassin. Only has one scene but it's a crucial
	one! Ideal playing age = 40 to 50 (needs to be a few yearsolder than Tony).
Inspector Hubbard	The copper! Intelligent, laid back, but nothing gets past him. On from after the interval. Ideal playing age = over 40.

Set in the early 1950s with a middle-class set of characters. As such, good diction (RP) is necessary. Gentlemen will need to be clean shaven and of smart appearance (no pony tails etc) although "Clark Gable moustaches" are acceptable. Don't get too hung up on the age requirements – these are the ideal but age boundaries can be pushed quite far (Ray Milland was 47 when he played Tony in the film).

I encourage and welcome first-time auditionees – NO ROLES HAVE BEEN PRE-CAST!!

On her return, in recent times, she appeared in The Producers and White Christmas for TOPS. Her roles for Toads were also numerous and varied. She appeared in Stepping Out, Under Milkwood, some Shakespeare plays, Flat Spin, was Gwendoline in The Importance of being Earnest, and gave a memorable performance horsing around as Alfred in the Wind in the Willows. Sarah's talent and personality will be greatly missed, but no more so than by her daughter Imogen, from whom she was inseparable, and who is in our thoughts and to whom we send condolences.
